The Albuquerque Folk Festival provides an opportunity for the public to experience and participate in folk music, song, dance, storytelling, and crafts through educational workshops, demonstrations, and performances. Folk activities enhance community expression and the continuance of cultural traditions.

THE FOLK ETHIC

The Albuquerque Folk Festival is devoted to the Folk Ethic and is focused on self-expression, community, friendship, and social consciousness. It is non-commercial. It embraces the arts with an emphasis on participation rather than virtuoso talent. Enjoyment is discovered through personal involvement rather than fame through performance and recording. Those who are skillful at an activity are willing to teach beginners, for they were once beginners themselves who learned from others willing to help without cost. Following the Folk Ethic demonstrates that enriching others through sharing folk activities and resources is the greatest form of self-expression.

- 12:30p Blues Harmonica (Jimmy Abraham) Jimmy Abraham of the Adobe Brothers will give an introduction to the blues harmonica, the fabled cross-harp. Bring a diatonic harmonica in the key of C. Jimmy will have a few harmonicas for those who need one, or buy one from one of the festival vendors.
- 1:30p Cowboy Songs (Steve Cormier) Steve Cormier did ranch, and farm work for nine years toured the US and Canada singing cowboy songs and telling stories. He holds a Ph.D. in American Studies with a dissertation on New Mexico ranching. Steve will start with a round robin sing, so bring an instrument and a working cowboy song! Steve has a new album: Steve Cormier... Wichita, Albuquerque, and Silver City.
- 2:30p Beginning Bodhrán (Irish Frame Drum) (B) (Glenn Maxwell) - In this hands-on workshop, Glenn will teach bodhrán, the traditional Irish drum. He will cover the basics of the instrument, the different playing styles, playing in sessions, basic rhythms patterns to Celtic music, and developing your own playing styles. Bring your own bodhrán, or we'll provide practice loaner bodhráns at no charge.
- 3:30p Hands on the Mountain Dulcimer (Kim McKee) -"There's no notes on a dulcimer...You just play it!" That is nearly true! Anyone can make a joyful noise with this 4 stringed wonder, no music experience please, no music reading skills allowed, just a happy pointer finger and lots of laughter! Dulcimers provided.

- 10:30a Multicultural Group Harmony SING (Arana Kalwaic) - World music, spirituals, rounds, folk. ALL VOICES WELCOME! No experience necessary. Learn by ear in 3-part harmony. Sponsored by Albuquerque's unique ABQ Choir Magic, an Ubuntu choir where "singing is our birthright."
- 11:30a Shape Note Singing (Shape Note Singers of New Mexico) - Description: Experience a way of reading music that dates to colonial times. Learn about this unique tradition while singing in four-part harmony. All vocal parts are welcome. No experience is necessary.
- 12:30p Harmonic (Overtone) Singing (Timothy Hill) An exploration of the naturally occurring harmonics (overtones) of the voice. Simple exercises can open hidden dimensions in the voice. No previous experience neces-
- 1:30p My Body, My Instrument (Eli del Puerto) Learn techniques to warm up your voice and create a song with fellow singers. No experience needed.
- 2:30p Group Singing (Dave Para) You may not know all of them, but they're all good songs with good choruses and easy to learn and sing. Harmonies welcome!
- 3:30p Celtic Singers (Michele Buchanan) Celtic Singers of NM is a non-audition group devoted to preserving the history and music of Celtic lands. At our sing-along session you will be invited to sing ancient songs, some phonetically, while we invite you to participate in "waulking the wool". Lyrics will be provided, as well as history and meaning of the songs we sing. Will you take the "high" road or the "low"? Come join us for something new that's very old!

10:30a DADGAD Guitar (Louis Scuderi) - Louis Scuderi of Mandology will give an introduction to playing guitar in DADGAD tuning. Sometimes known as Modal D tuning, it's an alternative tuning for guitar commonly used in folk music, especially Celtic styles. Many famous players, including Dick Gaughan, Jim Malcolm, Jimmy Page, and Micheal O Domhnaill use this tuning to great effect. We'll cover song and tune accompaniment, movable chord shapes, and various techniques based on student interest.

- 12:30p Intro to Traditional Irish Fiddle (Eileen Sullivan) In this introductory workshop, you will learn a lively tune or two and be introduced to style, rhythm and ornamentation in Irish music.
- 1:30p Traditional Up-Picking and Down-Picking Banjo Styles (Wayne Shrubsall) - Wayne Shrubsall of the Adobe Brothers will demonstrate traditional twoand three-finger up-picking and also clawhammer down-picking styles. Bring your banjo (not required)!

- 2:30p Beginning Hammered Dulcimer (B) (RJ Mirabal) Have you ever been curious about all those strings and the pretty sounds that float from a hammered dulcimer? Come learn how the notes are laid out how to play some tunes. Loaner dulcimers will be available. RJ is a Board of Director for the annual New Mexico Dulcimer Festival.
- 3:30p *Old-Time Fiddle* (Matt Rolland) Matt Rolland of RISO will show you old time fiddling techniques, cross tuning, and accompanying on the fiddle.

- 10:30a Singing in Rounds (Deirdre Garvey, Jeanne Brown, Jeanie McLellan) Round singing emerged in Europe during the 12th century and was popular as it had simple lyrics and melodies that could be repeated. The round is one of the earliest uses of counterpoint writing, heard in medieval churches, inns, and taverns from France to Britain and beyond. Join us for a dip into the world of rounds from all over the globe and get your morning boost by singing with gusto.
- 11:30a *The Cuban Tres/Discuss Pre-Salsa* (Greg Glassman / Kateri Lopez) Greg Glassman and Kateri Lopez of ¬°Hijo! will be discussing the origins and history of the Tres Cubano, masters of the instrument, various tunings, and the early regional Cuban music styles and groups that pre-date what is commonly referred to as 'Salsa'. Changui, Nengon, and Trova; early and modern.
- 12:30p Accompanying Yourself on Guitar (Jim Jones) For beginning and intermediate guitar pickers, Jim Jones will focus on some fairly simple techniques to sharpen your guitar skills and fill out your sound. Just bring your guitar!
- 1:30p Group Singing (Joe Jencks) A supportive hands-on vocal workshop aiming to demystify singing, and to provide concrete information that allows participants to connect the dots between how it feels to sing physiologically and getting more stable tone in vocal production. From breathing and stretching techniques to vocal warmups and beyond, learn to do more with what you've got!
- 2:30p Beginning Penny Whistle (B) (Cleve Sharp) The penny whistle is a terrific introduction to playing Celtic wind instruments. An introductory instrument is inexpensive and you can quickly learn a few tunes to play for yourself or in session. Join us to learn to play a few tunes. Have lots of fun. A penny whistle in the key of D is required bring yours or purchase an inexpensive one from a festival vendor.
