The Albuquerque Folk Festival provides an opportunity for the public to experience and participate in folk music, song, dance, storytelling, and crafts through educational workshops, demonstrations, and performances. Folk activities enhance community expression and the continuance of cultural traditions.

THE FOLK ETHIC

The Albuquerque Folk Festival is devoted to the Folk Ethic and is focused on self-expression, community, friendship, and social consciousness. It is non-commercial. It embraces the arts with an emphasis on participation rather than virtuoso talent. Enjoyment is discovered through personal involvement rather than fame through performance and recording. Those who are skillful at an activity are willing to teach beginners, for they were once beginners themselves who learned from others willing to help without cost. Following the Folk Ethic demonstrates that enriching others through sharing folk activities and resources is the greatest form of self-expression.

AFF AND COVID

A penny whistle in the key of D is required purchase an inexpensive one at class.
- 1:30p Sound Like the Carter Family (Kellie Allen and Pete Peterson) We will concentrate on one or two songs and deconstruct them in depth, working both on vocal techniques (the vocal harmonies that made the Carter Family sound so distinctive and recognizable) and on the guitar techniques developed by Maybelle Carter.
- 2:30p Fingerstyle Banjo Intro (Kellie Allen and Pete Peterson) Using TAB as an aid, we will teach one or two songs using thumb-lead two finger picking, supplementing this by showing three chords up the neck which can be used as a second harmony banjo part.
- 3:30p Mixing Old-Time, Bluegrass, and Irish Music (Charm City Junction) Charm City Junction will describe the various genres and the similarities/differences amongst how each style is jammed with a goal to show folks how you can play different styles in the same jam. It's easy to remain in your respective genre lane but it's fun to instill confidence in folks that they can jam in a style they may not be as familiar with. We'll play at various tempos to make it inclusive of all skill levels.

Workshop Tent 2



- 10:30a Multicultural Group Harmony Sing (ABQ Choir Magic) World Music, Contemporary, Rounds, Spirituals. ALL VOICES WELCOME! No experience necessary. Learn songs by ear, in 3-part harmony. Sponsored by Albuquerque's unique ABQ Choir Magic, an Ubuntu community choir where "singing is our birthright," successfully based in ABQ for the past 10 years.
- 11:30a *Women's A Cappella and Barbershop* (Rio A Cappella) Rio A Cappella is a women's barbershop group. We'll be teaching the basics about the difference between barbershop and other a cappella music, demo some music, and teach you a simple barbershop piece.
- 12:30p *Shape Note Singing* (Shape Note Singers of New Mexico) Experience a way of reading and singing music that dates to colonial times. Learn about this unique tradition while singing in four-part "a cappella" harmony. All vocal parts are welcome. No experience is necessary.
- 1:30p *Barbershop Tag Singing* (Enchanted Mesa Show Chorus) This a cappella chorus creates exciting performances that push the envelope of the barbershop art form. Come learn about barbershop singing and join in the experience.
- 2:30p At the Cajun-Creole Crossroads (Dirk Powell and Cedric Watson) Dirk and Cedric will explore the deep history and mutual influences of Cajun and Creole music and culture.
- 3:30p Cowboy Songs (Steve Cormier) Steve Cormier did ranch, and farm work for nine years and toured the US and Canada singing cowboy songs and telling stories. He holds a Ph.D. in American Studies with a dissertation on New Mexico ranching. Steve will start with a round robin sing, so bring an instrument and a working cowboy song! Steve has a new album: Steve Cormier—Wichita, Albuquerque, and Silver City.

Workshop Tent 3



- 10:30a *How to Sing Harmony Lines* (Janice Belflower) As a choir teacher and vocal coach, Janice has many opportunities to train singers to find and refine harmony lines in their singing. In this workshop, Janice will present various methods for hearing harmonies and provide suggestions on how to build harmony lines that support and add interest to a melody. Participants can expect to listen to examples, sing particular ear-training exercises, and be given the opportunity to better refine their own harmony singing skills. This workshop is perfect for singers who have always wanted to sing harmony lines but want some help getting started.
- 11:30a *Mountain Dulcimer (B)* (Irma Reeder) Also known as the Appalachian or lap Dulcimer, this instrument is one of the easiest to get started on! We'll review some basics then enjoy a slow jam of traditional tunes. You'll also see different types of dulcimers and hear some non-traditional ways of playing. There will be some loaners available for participants. Irma is a Winfield finalist and cofounded the New Mexico Dulcimer Association.

Workshop Tent 3 (Continued)

- 12:30p Social Justice Songs from the Americas (Lasotras) Lasotras will share songs from several different genres of social justice music from the Americas. Bring your instruments to play along, we will provide words and chords. We will also share some of our favorite artists and links where you can find a wealth of social justice music in English and Spanish.
- 1:30p *Piano Accordion* (Nathan & Jessie) Nathan of Nathan & Jessie will help you understand the bass button system on Piano Accordion. What to do with the left hand vs. the right hand. Improving dexterity and ideas for improvisation.
- 2:30p Hammered Dulcimer (B) (Scott Reeder) Have you ever been curious about all those strings and the pretty sounds that float from a hammered dulcimer? Come see various ways the instrument is played, how the notes are laid out, and play some tunes yourself! Loaner dulcimers will be available. Scott cofounded the New Mexico Dulcimer Association.
- 3:30p Klezmer Music (Beth Cohen) Klezmer refers to the dance music of the eastern European Jewish people. Learn to play a klezmer dance tune with Beth Cohen: a long-time ABQ music teacher and folk musician, Community Klezmer band director since 1995, co-producer of KlezmerQuerque & band member of The Rebbe's Orkestra & Goddess of Arno. All levels of musicians and all instruments are welcome.





Workshop Tent 4

- 10:30a *Bodhrán (B)* (Glenn Maxwell) In this hands-on workshop, Glenn will teach bodhrán, the traditional Irish drum. He will cover the basics of the instrument, the different playing styles, playing in sessions, basic rhythms patterns to Celtic music, and developing your own playing styles. Bring your own bodhrán, or we'll
- 11:30a *Clawhammer Banjo* (Wayne Shrubsall) Wayne Shrubsall of the Adobe Brothers will start by working with basic clawhammer then add in the melody teaching melodic clawhammer style. Bring your banjo (not required)!

provide practice loaner bodhráns at no charge.

- 12:30p *Bluegrass Fiddle* (Higher Ground Bluegrass) Pat Mahoney of Higher Ground Bluegrass will be teaching the fiddler's role in a bluegrass band, fiddle starts and stops, fiddle back-up phrases, then finish up with some great fiddle tunes.
- 1:30p *Irish Fiddle* (Eileen Sullivan) In this introductory workshop on traditional Irish fiddle, you will learn a lively tune or two and be introduced to style, rhythm and ornamentation in Irish music.
- 2:30p *Jarana Jarocha* (Otilio Ruiz) The Taller Jarana Jarocha Veracruzana is used in the south region of Veracruz Mexico. The Jarana Jarocha normally accompanies the Jarocho Harp. I will be teaching the most common strums in the jarocho music. We will learn traditional Veracruzano songs like La Bamba, El Cascabel, el Colas.
- 3:30p Garry Harrison Tunes (Virginia Creepers) Fiddler Garry Harrison was a tune collector in his home state of Illinois, and his field recordings of midwest musicians added a wealth of knowledge to the history of American old-time music. He also wrote fiddle tunes that, although "modern"—1970's through the early 2000's—have entered the old-time repertoire around the US and beyond. In this participatory workshop we'll explore 4 or 5 tunes that Harrison wrote.
